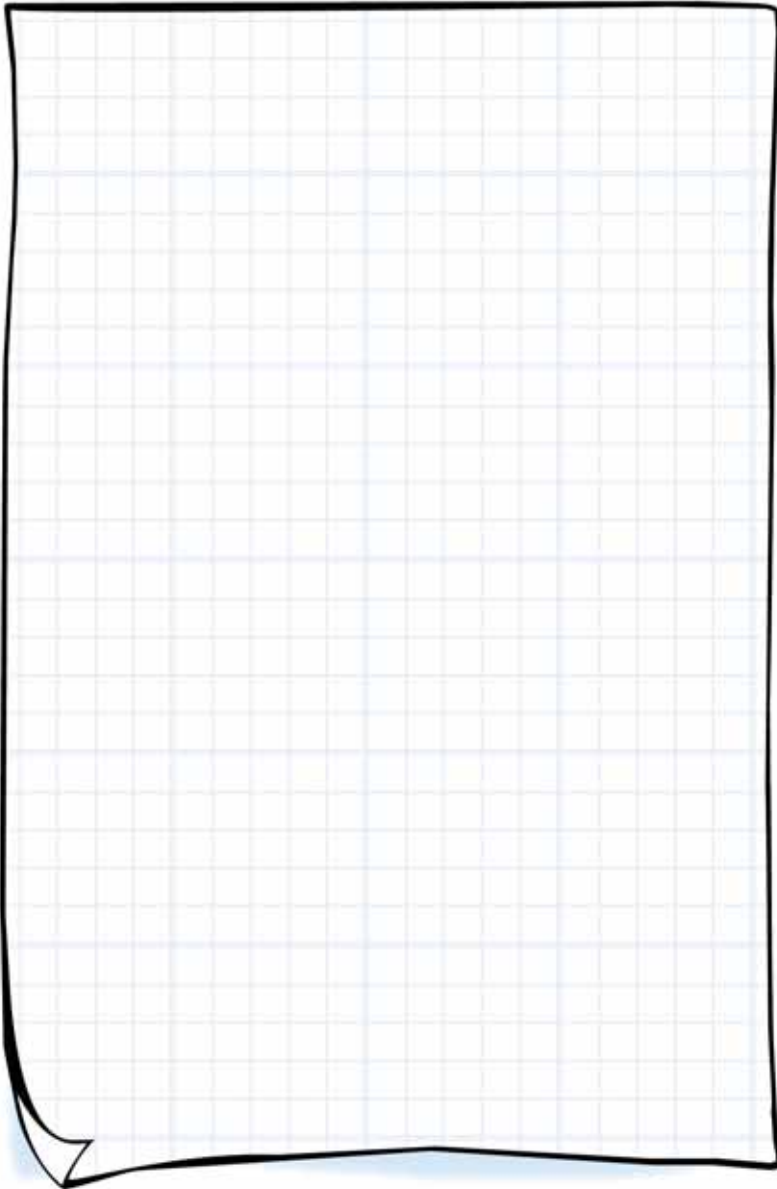

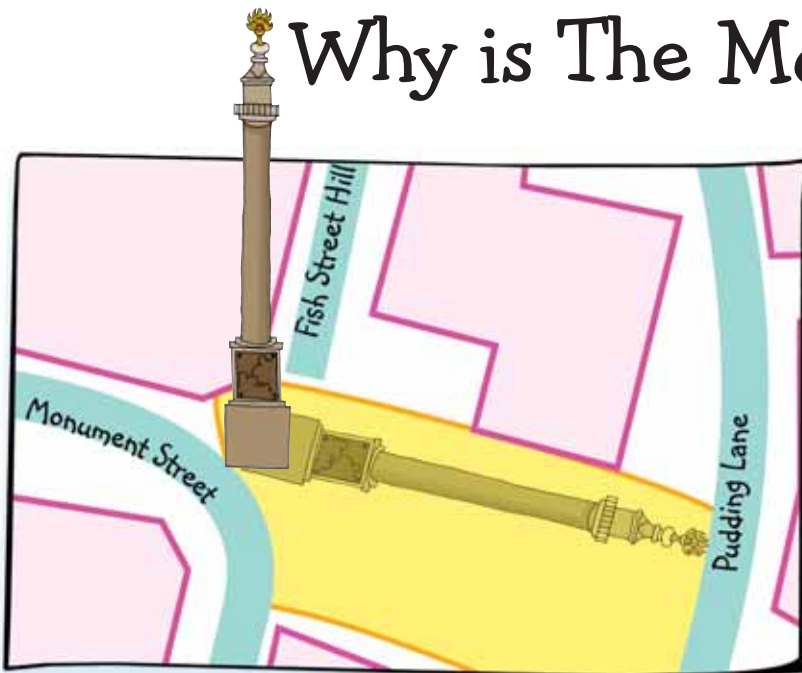

The Monument is 61 1/2 metres (202 feet) tall. It is the same distance from The Monument to Pudding Lane, where the Great Fire started on 2nd September 1666.
